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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Improving people's lives and sustainable development stems from the access to quality education. Undoubtedly, many developing countries including Nigeria are still struggling to reach a remarkable milestone in the provision of inclusive and equitable quality education for the promotion of lifelong learning opportunities for the masses. Advancing the education goal is indispensable in alleviating poverty and improving the economic standard of a nation. Although the educational development needs are immense, individual and collaborative commitments in leveraging resources and core competencies to support governments' efforts will change the situation greatly.

Ever since establishment, the **YATTIYR SCHOLARSHIP INITIATIVE (YSI)** has endeavored to meet up with and achieve this goal through helping individual students, especially indigent students of Kwara state, enroll and stay in school. Charged with the mission to improve access to quality education through advocacy and sponsorship, YSI embarks on projects themed on creating awareness on the importance of quality education in ensuring a better future.

Kwara Brain Point Challenge (KBPC) is an interschool quiz competition among public senior secondary schools in Ilorin Metropolis. **KBPC** is one of the projects of YSI focused on boosting literacy and academic competence among public school students within the state. The emphasis on public schools is centered on the perceived decline in the quality of education in these schools, thus creating a huge competence gap between students of public and private schools. According to the 2015 Nigeria Education Data Survey, children's literacy is about 40% higher in private schools than public schools; hence the need to change the narratives by exposing students attending public schools to platforms that will motivate the exploration of their academic potentials. This project is also proudly supported by the Kwara state Ministry of Education and Fizmayor Ltd., UK.

A total of 69 schools successfully participated in the preliminary stage of the competition held on November 17th, 2018 at venues within the four local government areas in Ilorin metropolis (Ilorin south, Ilorin west, Asa and Ilorin east). Progressively, **ten** best schools based on cumulative performance were selected for the semi-final stage held on November 24th, 2018 at Queen Elizabeth School Hall, Ilorin. Finally, the concluding stage of the competition featured six competing schools with the subsequent emergence of the first, second and third positions. The grand finale was held on 8th of December, 2018 at the Kwara state banquet hall, Ilorin. Prizes and awards were presented to the winners as well as sponsors of the event.

The project was largely successful and impactful and its sustenance has been proposed and considered.

STAGES OF THE QUIZ COMPETITION



PRELIMINARY STAGE

The preliminary stage of the quiz competition was held on the **17th of November, 2018** at designated centres in the four local governments in Ilorin metropolis.

The initiative had her members in all the local governments to coordinate the examination, with the supervision of official(s) from the Kwara State Ministry of Education. The examination commenced simultaneously at all centres before 10 am. The students were assessed on Mathematics, English Language, General Science (Chemistry, Biology and Physics), General Art (Government and Literature in English) and General Social Science (Commerce and Account).

ILORIN SOUTH

The venue of the examination for this local government was Bishop Smith Secondary School, Ilorin. A total of 15 schools participated in the assessment.

Preparation of venue and registration of students were conducted by YSI members early enough to ensure prompt commencement of the examination session. The programme kicked-off with the rendition of the second stanza of the country's national anthem led by a YSI member, **Miss Chioma Cynthia**. The welcome speech stating the purpose of the project, vision and mission of the initiative was delivered by **Miss Olayiwola Waheedah**, also a YSI member. She emphasized the need for the students to inculcate confidence and believe in the prowess of their abilities. She also reinstated the possibility of achieving and accomplishing goals provided there is relentless dedication and commitment. In her words "there is no pear without pain and no sweetness without sweat". The leader of the KBP Ilorin south team, **Mr. Abdullahi**, also addressed the students and explicitly outlined the rules guiding the examination.

Motivational speeches were also delivered by the project director, **Mr. Emmanuel Oloba**, and the convener, **Mr. John Fatoye**.

ILORIN WEST

The examination for this area was held at the Government High School, Adeta, Ilorin with 20 schools in attendance.

Participating schools and members of the initiative arrived at the venue early to start off venue preparation and registration, accordingly. The registration session was moderated by YSI members, **Miss Iteagbaraoluwa Adesina** (Finance team leader), **Miss Joy** and **Mr. Ridwan**. A representative from the Kwara State Ministry of Education was also present to monitor the conduct of the examination process. The programme commenced with the rendition of the second stanza of the Nigeria national anthem led by a YSI member.

The opening speech which entailed the objective of the KBPC project, mission and vision of the initiative was delivered by Head of the Logistics, **Mr. Stephen**. He also lucidly highlighted the instructions of the examination. The convener of the initiative, **Mr. John Fatoye**, was also on ground to motivate the students with his speech on “Being a better you”.

ILORIN EAST

The venue for the preliminary assessment for this area was the Government Secondary School, Fate. Registration commenced promptly and a total of 15 schools participated in the examination. The rendition of the second stanza of the Nigerian national anthem kicked off the program. The project director, **Mr. Oloba Emmanuel** visited the site to oversee the activities. He also explicitly outlined the modalities of the competition and the objective of the KBPC project. The mission and vision of YSI were also duly projected

ASA

The programme was held at the Government Day Secondary School (GDSS), Afon. Arrival of the schools and registration started quite early. The programme kicked-off following the proper accreditation of the participating school with the rendition of the 2nd stanza of the national anthem. The opening speech which entailed the objective of the KBPC project, mission and vision of the initiative was delivered by **Mr. Daud Abdullahi**, a YSI member.

The programme was anchored by **Mr. Abdulsalam Mubarak**, who spoke on the modalities of the competition, and explained the rules and regulation guiding the exam. A total of 15 schools partook in the examination.

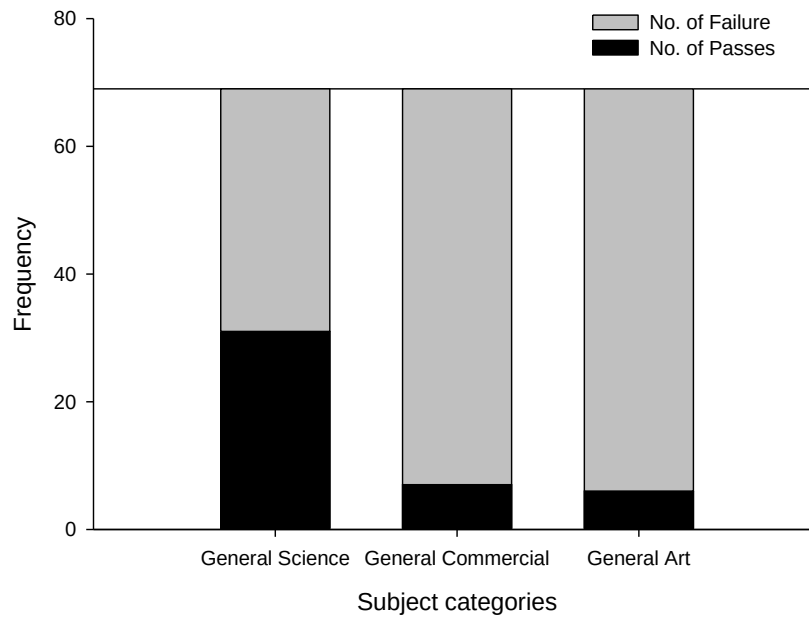


Figure 1: Subject-based performance analysis of all the 69 participating schools

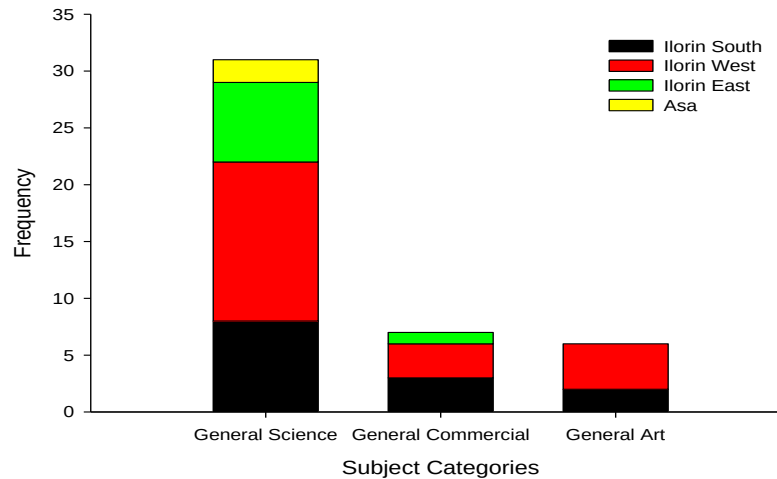


Figure 2: Subject-based performance analysis per local government area

Conclusion: Examinations at all centres lasted for about 90 minutes and marking commenced immediately. Out of the 69 schools that participated in the preliminary stage, the ten best schools based on cumulative performance were shortlisted for the next stage. Notably, none of the schools from Asa Local Government qualified for the semifinal stage. Results are presented in tables 1 – 4. The subject-based performance assessments are presented in figures 1 and 2.

SEMIFINAL STAGE

The semifinal stage of the KBPC interquiz competition was held on the 24th of November, 2018 at the Queen Elizabeth School Hall, Ilorin. Representatives (students and teachers) from nine out of the ten qualified schools were in attendance. Also, representatives from the Kwara state Ministry of Education led by **Mr. Kayode Alabi**, pressmen from Kwara TV and the chief editor of Fidelinfo (an online media outlet) were present to monitor and cover the event, accordingly.

Following the registration and verification of the respective representatives, the programme commenced with the rendition of the second stanza of the national anthem. Afterwards, the convener, **Mr. John Fatoye** delivered his introductory speech, welcoming all present school representatives, teachers and guests. His speech also reiterated the importance of education in individual and societal development. Moderating the quiz sessions were the quizmasters- **Miss Aribisala Damilola, Mr. Daud Abdullah Olalekan, Mr. Babatunde Jamiu** and **Mr. Adedoyin Gabriel**. The contestants, teachers and the general audience were acquainted with the modalities and rules guiding the quiz sessions. The quiz, comprising of two sessions, commenced at 12:12 pm and ended at 2:56 pm. The first session comprised of English language, Mathematics and General knowledge questions, while the second session comprised of General Science, General Art and General Commercial questions.

Schools battled head-to-head with each representative striving to ensure that his/her school makes it to the finals. Teamwork became the keyword. Individual confidence, accuracy as well as speed were virtues that filled the atmosphere of the hall. The collation of the final scores and the announcement of the six schools advancing to the final stage followed immediately after the quiz sessions. The results are presented in the table 3.

The general conduct of the quiz was free and fair as acknowledged by the students and teachers interviewed by the Content team of YSI. It should be noted that the quiz questions were prepared by randomly selecting past WASSCE and NECO questions for all the subject categories. The six schools that progressed to the final stage were:

1. Government Day Secondary School, Airport
2. Queen Elizabeth Secondary School
3. Ansar-u-l Islam Secondary School
4. Senior Secondary School, Ero omo
5. Olokuta Senior Secondary School
6. Senior Secondary School, Ita Alamu

Excitement and despair filled the air simultaneously as respective schools expressed their fates in words and actions. According to the feedbacks gathered from the interviews conducted by the

YSI Content team, representatives of the schools that qualified were just as anxious as they were excited; all in anticipation of the finals.

The closing speech was delivered by the project director, Mr. Oloba Tobilola. He commended the efforts of the contestants and encouraged the representatives of the eliminated schools to see themselves as winners and forge ahead for bigger accomplishments. The Yattiy anthem was recited and the event ended at about 3:15 pm. Photo sessions were held afterwards.

The final stage of the KBPC interquiz competition was held on the 8th of December, 2018 at the Kwara State Banquet Hall, Ilorin. Representatives (students and teachers) from the six qualified schools were all in attendance. Additionally, teachers and students from other schools that participated in the preceding stages of the competition were also present. The array of dignitaries that graced the event was led by the Honorable Commissioner for Education and Human Capital Resources in Kwara state, Hajia Bilkisu Oniyangi. Others included the Permanent Secretary, Ministry of Education and Human Capital Resources, Hajia M.A. Garba; President of ANCOPSS, Kwara state chapter, Alhaji Toyin Abdullahi; Assistant State Secretary of ANCOPPS, Alhaji A. Tejini; Director of Planning, Mrs. Mary Ibiyeye; Director of Personal Management, Mr. Bamidele Adebara and Deputy Director, Teacher Development, Mr. Alabi, J.A. 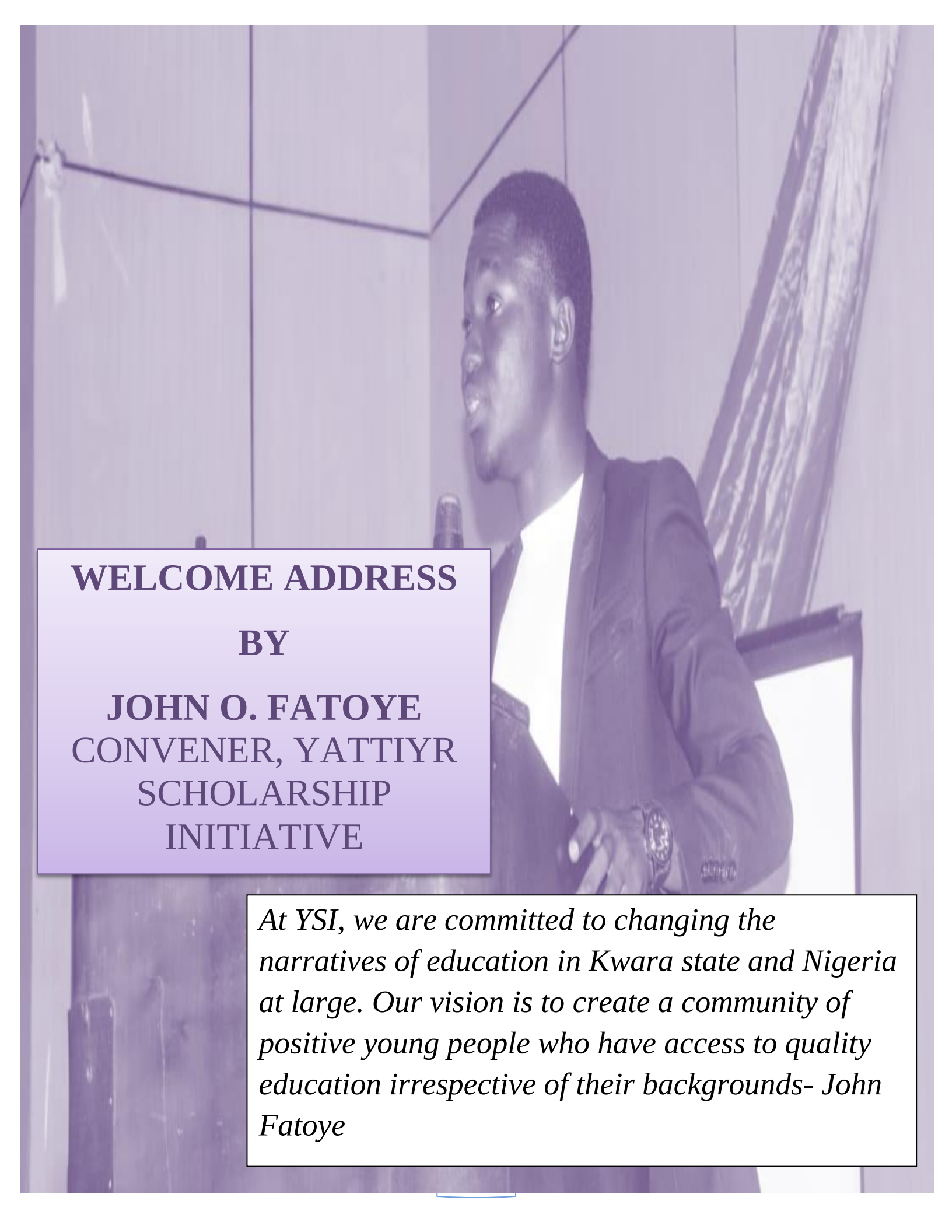

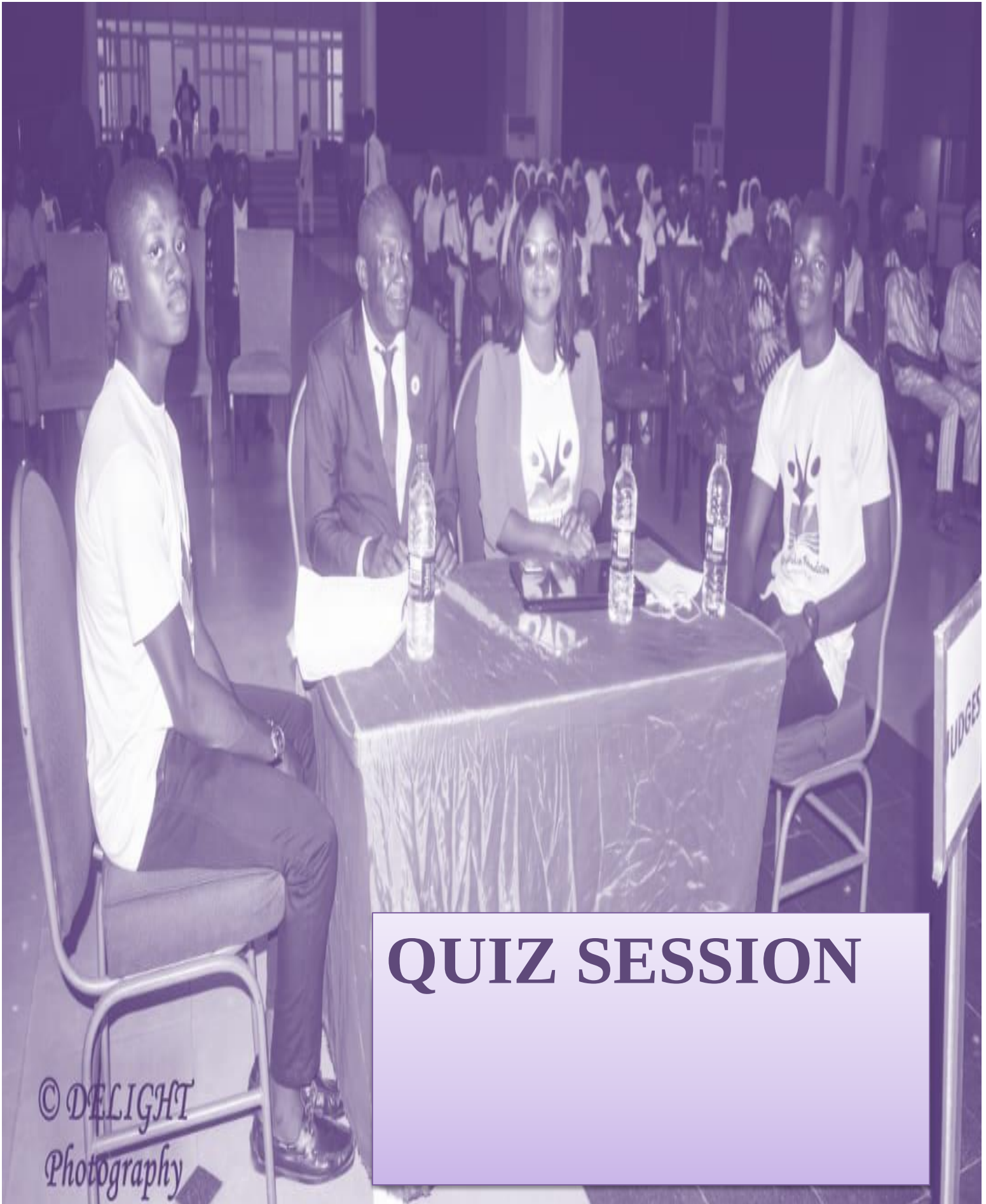

QUIZ SESSION

The session was moderated by the quiz masters- **Mr. Alabi J.A., Dr. Badmus, Miss Gbala Ifeoluwa, Mr. Farhan Sodiq** and **Mr. Daud Abdullahi Olalekan**. The quiz, comprising of three sessions slotted in between speech presentations, commenced at 11:18 am and ended at 1:20 pm. The first session comprised of English language, the second session comprised of Mathematics and General Knowledge questions, while the third session comprised of General Science, Art and Commercial questions. The schools fiercely battled out for the grand prize. The collation of the final scores was done by the quizmasters and three schools tied at the second position. The three schools, Senior Secondary School, Ita-Alamu, Government Day Secondary School, Airport and Olokuta Senior Secondary School participated in the tensed session which was eventually sorted by the intellectual intervention of the Honorable Commissioner. The announcement of the results in ascending order on the leaderboard followed immediately. The results are presented in the tables 6 and 7. The general conduct of the quiz was free and fair as acknowledged by

the students and teachers interviewed. More so, the overall performances of the students in all tested subject areas were fair, although lower compared to the previous stages. Like the semifinal, the quiz questions were prepared by randomly selecting past WASSCE, NECO and JAMB questions for all the subject categories.
